Exodus: A Just Community

Exodus 20:22-23:33

In these chapters, God applies the ten commandments to the Israelites' everyday lives, establishing guiding principles for them to live by in order to be a set apart nation that represents both his love and justice to the world. Today, God calls his people, the Church, to be that holy community.

Application

- 1. Does reading through these holy standards for God's people feel invasive or restraining to you? If so, what does that reveal about your relationship with God?
- 2. In what ways are you following the Spirit-led calling of Acts 2 to worship God in awe, serve the family of God sacrificially, and create pathways for others into God's Kingdom?

Key Points

- When God's people do the right thing, it is because they belong to him.
- The Bible was written for us, but not to us, so we should be careful to consider its
 original context rather than interpreting it through our own cultural lens.
- God calls us to remove all other gods from our lives—anything we look to instead
 of him for hope, security, or provision.
- Stealing is a direct assault against the God of manna—the One who provides for our daily needs. The root of theft is envy, which reveals we doubt God's provision.
- We must deal ruthlessly with sin by acknowledging its destructive, pervasive, and infectious nature and putting it to death when we recognize it.
- Anything we hold back from God holds us back from experiencing delight in our relationship with him.
