Protector – Lesson 2

Memory Verse: 2 Samuel 22:2 “The Lord is my protector; He is my strong fortress.” (GNT)

Key Point: God is always with us!

Bible Verse: 1 Samuel 17:34-37

SCHEDULE:

Five Finger Gospel (optional)

LESSON:

This is a story from 1 Samuel 17:34-37 (1).

Last week we learned about a boy named David and how he would one day become a king. Before **David** became King he **was a shepherd** (2). **A shepherd cares for and protects the sheep** (3) and they guide them out in the fields.

David takes care of the sheep and protects them. A shepherd, like **David**, also **protects the sheep from any wild animals** (4) that may want to hurt them. In 1 Samuel 17:34-37 the Bible tells us that sometimes when David is taking care of his father's sheep, a lion or bear comes and takes a sheep from the flock. Coyotes, **lions, and bears would love to** carry them off for food and **eat the sheep** (5). But David doesn't want that to happen. The shepherd must watch them very carefully for any signs of danger. The shepherd always stays with the sheep and never leaves them.

So **David trusts God** (6). He is brave when he protects the sheep. **He rescues the sheep from the lions and bears** (7). He goes after the lion or bear and, using a heavy stick, he hits it and saves the sheep from its mouth. If the lion or bear turns around to attack David, he grabs hold of its hair and strikes it down. **God protects David** many times and saves him **from lions and bears** (8). David has faith in God and knows that God will protect him. God knows everything David needs and he takes care of him. God is a shepherd to David just like David is a shepherd to his sheep.

Key Point: God is always with us!
